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### INTRODUCTION

In 2005, 19 percent of D.C. residents lived in poverty, 10.8 percent lived in severe poverty, and over 9,300 were homeless.<sup>1</sup> While D.C. no longer has the *highest* rate of poverty in the country, as it did from 1996 to 1998, it still ranks among the top three states and territories.<sup>2</sup>

In the District of Columbia, there are countless providers of anti-poverty programs, but the system is splintered, making sources of relief difficult to access. For example, individuals seeking homeless services can choose from more than 70 agencies providing assistance through 180 projects.<sup>3</sup> This fragmented system exists in part because services are organized by their funding streams, which can make navigating the system difficult and complex for those attempting to access services.

The District of Columbia Department of Human Services (DCDHS) is embarking on a multi-pronged initiative to examine the Washington, D.C. poverty assistance system. DCDHS is conducting this research in order to simplify how to access services through making the process more transparent and easier to navigate. The goal is for the system of services to focus on the family's needs instead of the funding stream. This will not only enable the system to serve more people, but it will also improve service effectiveness and efficiency.

This initiative requires a thorough understanding of how services in D.C. are funded and where they are delivered. With this knowledge, DCDHS will be prepared to streamline the assistance process and create a stronger poverty assistance network that maximizes its efforts.
