Question 1: Please provide more information on the formatted file type called "Atom".					
<p>Answer to Question 1: The District of Columbia has provided public access to city operational data directly through the Internet. Now the District has gone one step further and is now streaming live data that District agencies gather through normal operations. CapStat reports agency information hourly, daily, weekly and monthly, depending on the underlying dataset. Data is provided in three formats: 1) Really Simple Syndication (RSS) offers summary report information; 2) XML provides detailed data usable by desktop spreadsheet applications; and 3) Atom format provides detailed data better suited for the parsing of information by automated programs for populating databases, displaying information on web pages, or other similar applications. The Atom Syndication Format is an XML language used for web feeds, while the Atom Publishing Protocol (APP) is a HTTP-based protocol for creating and updating Web resources. Question 2: What other formatted file types do we expect to see. Please provide a list.					
<p>Answer to Question 2: The formatted files types included in the RFI are types the District may encounter as it gathers requirements from agencies. File types will include Microsoft Excel, Atom, CSV, and XML; however, it is possible additional files types will be encountered. It is possible for example that an agency uses a MS Word document and a table to gather and track data.</p>					
Question 3: Please provide the mainframe data types or legacy databases. (Please list)					
<p>Answer to Question 3: The District has countless systems in place and legacy databases in each agency. Examples of such mainframe data types and legacy databases are CICS and MUMPS. CICS – DC accounting system RStars and MUMPS – DOH/Medicaid systems.</p>					
Question 4: Can you expand on the concept of "Automatic discovery/reverse engineering of database structure"?					
<p>Answer to Question 4: The product selected will provide a tool set that will save the District time and money by removing some of the manual processes from the project. For example, a tool set that extracts database's entities, attributes, relationships, indexes, triggers, procedures, and other objects depending on the particular database or a tool that re-draws the db structure.</p>					
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Question 5: Please describe the OCTO environment/standard for the Enterprise Data warehouse.

Answer to Question 5: The Application database(s) store the operational data in a format conducive to the applications (e.g., Neighborhood View, Mobile View, Analyst View) within CAPSTAT. The operational data receives its spatial characteristics and lookup values during the staging process before being moved to the CapStat database. Data is extracted from District agencies using a variety of methods, based on the database platform, security, and accessibility of the data source. Data transfer in most cases occurs automatically using an EAI technology (e.g., Sonic). However, to expedite the delivery process, data transfers may be initiated by other methods such as ODBC or database links. Data sources are not homogeneous; the data transfer processes involve more than a simple plug-and-play procedure. Likewise, the agencies present business requirements restricting access to data. Although non-technical in nature, these obstacles are noteworthy and must be considered. A Data Warehouse (DW) stores data within CAPSTAT to support complex, inter-agency data analysis for the District. The data is transformed at the Staging database before being delivered to the DW to fit within the supporting model.




Figure 1 - Flow of Data with the Program
